RECENT NMC ACTIVITIES

Island Rockhounds Show @ Old Bethpage Restoration Village



IRS' annual gem, mineral, fossil and jewelry show March 12-13, Nassau Mineral Club covered two exhibit tables with mineral and fossil specimens and beautiful samples of artistic handiwork crafted by its members. Joe A., Leona K., Jim S., Rosemarie W., Diane A., Maria V. and June M. were on hand to invite visitors to look over the wide range of things we do at the club. Twenty people signed up to be notified about future workshops or arrange a future visit to NMC – an encouraging sign. Some highlights: Leona made “teachable moment” handouts with mounted mineral samples



and other science related materials for middle school children. They disappeared as quickly as she put them out! Joe brought a collection of meteorites, amber, fossils and florescent stones which he used to capture the curiosity of children and adults alike. Kids especially enjoyed searching for insects millions of years old still stuck in amber. Their parents were awed by the density of his stony iron samples from outer space and his captivating accounts of meteorite discoveries.

Byzantine Chainmaille Workshop



Diane Angus led a packed workshop Saturday, March 26 at Garvies Point on how to construct a Byzantine chain. When repeated, the six-ring link design forms an ornate, rich pattern that is both strong and attractive. The Byzantine weave often appears in necklaces and bracelets made with precious metal. Diane demonstrated how to create Byzantine

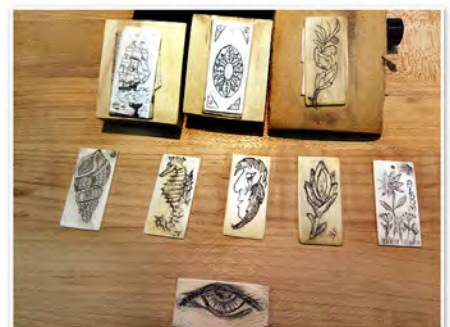


links by using “shower curtain jump rings” - an inspired idea, and she provided much appreciated handouts with written instructions. Kits containing enough copper jump rings to create a 7” length of Byzantine chain were available at the workshop as well as a loom for holding chainmaille.

Scrimshaw Workshop

On Saturday, April 9, expert John King from SG&MC gave a workshop to NMC participants on the art of creating scrimshaw. He brought a display of work to illustrate different techniques and reviewed the kinds of mediums used through the ages by different cultures, noting that ivory is now outlawed for sale or resale in many parts of the world. The class had first-timers and experienced practitioners but at the end of the workshop everyone managed to create unique pieces of scrimshaw which revealed the ingenuity of their creators.

NMC TIP SHEET

WAYS TO IDENTIFY YOUR COLLECTION OF MINERALS

– (from NMC ARCHIVES)

1. Color – Any variations?
2. Luster – How is light reflected? Metallic?
3. Opacity – Transparent, Translucent, Opaque?
4. Streak test – What color appears when streaked on unglazed tile?
5. Heft – Is it heavy for its size? (Specific gravity)
6. Hardness – MOHS Scale (#1-10), scratch test
7. Odor?
8. Taste - (Not recommended. Some minerals are toxic!)
9. Feel – Soapy, slippery, harsh?
10. Habit – Crystal formation. How crystals form with one another = “state of aggregation”
11. Cleavage – Perfect cleavage?
12. Fracture – How does it tend to break?
13. Fluorescence – What happens under UV light?
14. Is it magnetic?
15. Chemical Tests – How will the mineral react with certain acids?

After properties 1-15 are recorded, your mineral’s characteristics might lead to grouping it by chemical composition. There are seven major groups including silicates and oxides, the most abundant.

THE AFMS Code of Ethics

I will respect both private and public property and will do no collecting on privately owned land without the owner’s permission.

I will keep informed on all laws, regulations of rules governing collecting on public lands and will observe them.

I will to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.

I will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas.

I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind – fences, signs, buildings.

I will leave all gates as found.

I will build fires in designated or safe places only and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.

I will discard no burning material – matches, cigarettes, etc.

I will fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock.

I will not contaminate wells, creeks or other water supply.

I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.

I will practice conservation and undertake to utilize fully and well the materials I have collected and will recycle my surplus for the pleasure and benefit of others.

I will support the rockhound project H.E.L.P. (Help Eliminate Litter Please) and will leave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.

I will cooperate with field trip leaders and those in designated authority in all collecting areas.

I will report to my club or Federation officers, Bureau of Land Management or other authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other materials on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational and scientific purposes.

I will appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources.

I will observe the “Golden Rule”, will use “Good Outdoor Manners” and will at all times conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and public “image” of rockhounds everywhere.
